

Dear Parishioners,

Today's readings invite us to reflect on several themes: consider the words of prophets; listen with open hearts to the true voice of the Lord; and hear the authority in the teachings of Jesus.

In the first reading, we find Moses reassuring the people that someone will come after him to continue to reveal the message of God. Moses would not be with them forever and the people needed to know someone would continue to share the messages.

He reminds the people that a prophet is what they asked for during their days at Horeb. They said, "Let us not again hear the voice of the Lord, our God, nor see this great fire any more, lest we die." Moses reveals what the Lord has said about the prophet he will raise up. The Lord will raise someone in their midst that will speak his words, but if someone does not listen to the words the prophet speaks, the Lord himself will make them answer for it. On the other hand, a prophet who speaks falsely or presumes what the Lord says will pay with his life.

As we see in the first reading, prophets are called to speak for God and were a gift that allowed those in the time of Moses to hear the word of God in a way that would not overwhelm them.

Yet, how are the people to know which prophet is truly called by God? The world is full of false prophets. There are televangelists interested only in money for their pockets despite their claims of more worthy causes. There are the street corner preachers who scream of the end times and the fiery wrath of an angry God.

Who do you see as modern-day prophets?

The responsorial psalm reminds us to always praise God. It begins with an invitation to sing joyfully about the rock of our salvation, and to kneel and bow in worship. Yet, in the second half, we are warned not to tempt the Lord as their fathers and ancestors had done in the desert. We are to keep our hearts open to the word of God. How are you tempted to harden your heart?

Watching the news sometimes, it may seem there is an abundance of hardened hearts in the world, though witnessing the people that have pitched in to help the victims of recent hurricanes and disasters certainly shows the opposite. We need to remain open and not ask God for things in a way that is tempting and manipulative.

While Paul in the second reading may seem to be expressing the benefits of unmarried life for Christians, the truth of his words is deeper than that. Paul and his followers expected the second coming of Jesus to happen at anytime. Paul wanted to stress to his listeners that all followers of Christ needed to avoid the trappings of the temporary and earth-bound life. He was reminding everyone in the community to dedicate themselves completely to God. We need to give God our undivided attention.

Jesus speaks with authority in today's Gospel. He heals a man possessed by demons. Yet the healing isn't what catches the attention of those in attendance. It is his teaching. Did they not listen to the words of the demon telling them exactly who was in their midst? Jesus rebukes the demon who asks him on behalf of the others: "Have you come to destroy us?" The demon does not let go very easily. What struggles in our lives do we hold on to despite our desire for freedom?

Jesus' reputation as a teacher grew through his teaching in Capernaum. He taught as someone learned. The crowd could not believe these words were coming from someone with his background as a carpenter's son. They expected a simpler teaching, not the way Jesus addressed the crowd.

Jesus' words drew even more followers. His words and deeds have the power to change us too, if we are open to hearing his words in our heart.
