

Dear Parishioners,

I remember vividly the day my high school theology teacher introduced the concept of "social sin." The more I began looking for evidence of social sin around me, the more I began to recognize the reverberating effects of my choices. When I buy a t-shirt, do I know whether those who made it were treated with dignity and paid a fair wage? When I decide whether to drive or take the bus, do I weigh my contribution to environmental degradation and its disproportionate impacts on poor communities and communities of color?

I could no longer think about sin only in terms of my direct interactions with other people. In our complex, global world, we must recognize that we are integrally involved in the systems that reproduce social sin.

The U.S. Catholic Bishops' statement, "Communities of Salt and Light," defines social sin as sin that "exists within any structure in society that oppresses human beings, violates human dignity, stifles freedom and/or imposes great inequity." In other words, it is about how our society structures injustice into the networks of relationships that make up our day-to-day lives.

Once we see our own participation in social sin, no matter how inadvertent, what are we to do? When we are speaking of a more conventional definition of sin, the answer is fairly straightforward: Avoid the sinful behavior. Does this mean that we should avoid any action that contributes to social sin? A brief reflection reveals the impossibility of this. In essence, we would have to withdraw from society entirely, living as hermits, to accomplish it.

The bishops include in their definition of social sin that "once we have recognized these patterns and structures that are sinful, we need to move toward action on behalf of justice and the common good."

Our response, they say, must be to work within the sinful systems to make them less sinful. The work of changing systems is slow. And it is true that the more setbacks we encounter, the more the life of a hermit might begin to look enticing.

Jesus, too, lived in a complicated time, under a government and social system that oppressed his community. In the Gospel today, Jesus retreats into the desert for 40 days. Though Mark's version of the story is sparse on detail about why Jesus journeyed into the desert, we could imagine that perhaps Jesus himself was struggling with the hermit-versus-changemaker conundrum. Was struggling against the established order better than retreating from participation in sinful systems?

In the end, Jesus returns to Galilee and calls on people to repent and believe in the Gospel. He had made his choice: to re-engage with the challenging systems of his society and continue his work to reform them.

Jesus was an integral member of his community; his choices did not affect just him. We hear this truth echoed in the first reading, in which God establishes a covenant with Noah. This is a three-way covenant: "the covenant between me and you and every living creature with you," God says (Genesis 9:12).

Ultimately, this covenant that God makes with us is the answer to the aforementioned conundrum. We are connected to every other living creature, and this is what continues to call us back out of the desert.

Being in relationship with God is about being in relationship with other people. This means we must engage with the systems of social sin in our communities and work to bring them more in line with God's vision.
