

Dear Parishioners,

Most of our growth in life is slow-paced and subtle. However, there are those transforming moments when we see with new eyes, where a new vision takes shape in us. Sometimes, they come when we are faced with impossible choices like Abraham in the first reading. At other times, they are mountaintop experiences like the disciples had in the Gospel reading. These transfigurations are pivotal events, times when we cannot go backwards, and where the past informs our future in a new way.

Are there historic events which have completely redefined your worldview? It is likely that many people can give a detailed account of their day on September 11, 2001. it is easy to recall images, feelings and thoughts from an experience that is simply referred to by a number — 9/11. Then we were immersed in the Pandemic with many more dead. In both these instances, life as we know it in the United States and throughout much of the world changed dramatically. How have you been forced to view the world differently since those days?

What personal events have changed you forever? When asking a woman to recount her story of pregnancy and giving birth, be prepared for a long, involved description, To the listening ear, she will share details, descriptions, and a barrage of emotions. She will remember so passionately, so intensely, because through the privilege of co-creating with God, everything in her life took on new purpose and meaning. What life-altering moments have reshaped your priorities and identity?

What crossroads moments have set the stage for a new normal in your life? If you have grieved the loss of a loved one, you know the struggle of figuring out how to live without them. Life went on as usual, and yet everything changed. The quilt grandma made for you came out from the back of the closet to remind you of her love. After the death of a spouse, tears flowed when you filled out your income tax forms as a single person for the first time in over 50 years. During the holidays, it seemed the world celebrated family togetherness and merriment while your heart broke for the family member who was never coming home for Christmas again. As you wrote a new soundtrack for your life, you re-evaluated what was really most important to you. What have those landmark crossings taught you to cherish and value?

In this Sunday's first reading, Abraham is faithfully following God's call on a path that is ripping out his heart and crushing his dreams. In the end, God is not really asking Abraham to sacrifice his son, but only the ego, security and honor he has attached to his son. In return, God blesses Abraham's sacrifice with a vision far beyond his dreams. Is there something clouding your sight and keeping you from a much more abundant view?

We can imagine that Jesus taught and slept, prayed and cried, worked and celebrated, alongside the disciples for months. In the Gospel passage, they saw him in a whole new light. Once they had seen him with a new set of eyes, their vision was transfigured. They saw the world differently. Their purpose and meaning, priorities and identity changed. They had a new realization of what was really important to them. Frightened yet strengthened by a transformed vision of Jesus and themselves, they journeyed into a new normal in their lives.

How are you being called to see with new eyes? What is clouding your view of the transfigured Christ? How does the world look different through Jesus's vision? Does your identity and your purpose need to be transformed? Should you see your priorities and values in a new light? Today's readings invite us to envision that God's dream for us is beyond anything we could have ever imagined.
